In support of the career development of young clinician scientists, Friends of CIHR has continued its collaborative programs with the Canadian Society for Clinical Investigation (CSCI) and the Canadian Academy of Health Sciences (CAHS). exposure of the Friesen Prize Laureates throughout the year with Institutional visits and evening broadcasts on national radio through CBC Radio One "Ideas" continues to deliver our message countrywide to centres of higher learning and into the homes of Canadian listeners. On September 19, 2012, Dr. Marc Tessier-Lavigne, President of Rockefeller University, was honoured as the 7th Henry G. Friesen International Prizewinner. Dr. Tessier-Lavigne was introduced to key Ottawa health research personalities at a Leaders' Breakfast hosted jointly by FCIHR with the Ottawa Hospital Research Institute (OHRI) in a stunning setting at the Canadian Museum of Nature. At midday, an informal luncheon gathering of Ottawa neuroscientists allowed for a lively discussion of current Neuroscience programs. Dr. Tessier-Lavigne then met with senior program directors at Health Canada where he discussed advanced neuroscience priorities and the unique research ambiance at Rockefeller University. Later that afternoon, Dr. Tessier-Lavigne gave his public address to a standing-room audience of clinician scientists in training and senior members of the Canadian Academy of Health Sciences (CAHS). His talk, "The future of translational medicine and drug discovery: is the glass half empty or half full?" was well received and videorecorded for future broadcast online. Later that evening, a Dinner celebration was held at the Canadian Museum of Nature where Dr. Tessier-Lavigne was presented the Friesen Award.

Joint Symposium with CSCI

On September 19th, 2012, our 5th annual FCIHR Joint Symposium with CSCI took place in Ottawa immediately prior to the Public Forum. This Symposium entitled, "Translational Science and Research in Medicine: Scope, Challenges and

Implementation", was chaired by **Dr. Bruce McManus**, VP of FCIHR, and **Dr. Brent Winston**, President of CSCI, who introduced 3 guest speakers including **Dr. Allan Kaplan**, Director of the Institute of Medical Science (IMS), U of T; **Dr. Vicki Seyfert-Margolis**, Senior Advisor, Regulatory Science and Innovation, Office of the Commissioner, US Food and Drug Administration (FDA); and **Dr. Bernie Zinman**, Director, Leadership Sinai Centre for Diabetes, U of T. The Joint Symposium complemented the Friesen Lecture and broadened the discussion of translational sciences as a priority in Canadian health research.

Institutional visit at the University of Ottawa and Luncheon Lecture to CAHS – Sept. 20th, 2012

In accepting the Friesen Prize, the Laureate undertakes 1 or more institutional visits during the year following the Friesen Prize presentation. Dr. Tessier-Lavigne gave a university-wide talk to the Brain & Mind Institute at the University of Ottawa, where he was introduced by **Dean Jacques Bradwejn** and **Dr. Tony Hakim**. The title of his talk was, "Wiring the Brain: the Logic and Mechanisms of Neuronal Guidance" and was well received.

At noon, the Canadian Academy of Health Sciences hosted a luncheon with Dr. Tessier-Lavigne as the keynote speaker where he briefly explained the molecular basis and cellular markers of Alzheimer's Disease and new molecular targets for treatment. Our thanks to Dr. Tom Marrie, President of CAHS, for his collaborative support of the Friesen International Prize Program. Following lunch, **Mr. Paul Kennedy**, host of CBC Radio One "Ideas" recorded an interview with Dr. Tessier-Lavigne for broadcast early in 2013.
